BOARD PRESIDENT LETTER

I am honored to write this letter on behalf of the 2019-20 House of Ruth Board of Directors. We find ourselves in unique and challenging times. I am proud of the work that the House of Ruth has devoted to domestic violence survivors and their families to ensure their safety and wellbeing. The COVID-19 pandemic, along with the renewed call for social justice and equality in the face of racism and continued police brutality, has brought to the forefront the need for the services that House of Ruth provides. We know that stay-at-home orders confine partners and children in homes that may not be safe and that for those in abusive situations, there are few options to leave. In compliance with new pandemic ordinances, the agency continues to provide emergency shelter for those in need. In addition, we continue to offer crisis services remotely via telephone, maintaining client safety and confidentiality. House of Ruth's work is rooted in non-violence and creating a just world for all. As the agency continues to provide much-needed services, we condemn all forms of racism and oppression. Ending oppression is fundamental to achieving our vision of a violence-free world. House of Ruth continues to promote the belief that peace and justice must be realized for all.

The work that we do is possible only because of you. The annual report highlights some of the accomplishments that House of Ruth has achieved. Fundraising and fund development continues to be a core focus of the agency. Most of our funding comes from government grants, and we are continually monitoring the political climate for potential shifts in federal, state, and local funding priorities. We are focusing on building our foundation funding and individual donor funds to protect our budget from swings in public funding as well as to further program development. As we move forward, we depend on the generosity of our donors to support us in responding to the current trends when providing services to our clients as well as prevention education outreach to our community.

Special thanks to our House of Ruth staff and generous donors this past year for support of our first 'Tacos and Brews' event, hosted with Claremont Craft Ales, and our Moveable Feast Dinner, which we organized as a virtual event.

Thank you for your support and confidence in the work of House of Ruth.

LETTER



As I reflect on this past year, let me begin by saying how grateful I am that we made it through the many ups and downs. This past year has challenged us at House of Ruth in ways we never expected. Although we cannot ignore the pain and hardship our community is going through right now, I want to highlight the resilience and strength of our clients, staff, volunteers, board, and the broader community. Thank you, each and every one of you, for your generosity and dedication to rising above these challenges and staying true to our mission. Our fundamental commitment is and will always be to the safety, health, and well-being of survivors of domestic violence and their families.

We started the year off with House of Ruth staff and board members coming together to create a three-year strategic plan to carry us through 2023. We solicited critical feedback from all staff, clients, and our many community partners to inform House of Ruth's priorities for the next three years. After much discussion and reflection, we developed the following four priorities: ensure inclusivity and intentional services to clients; to retain staff in order to ensure mission delivery; to strengthen community partnerships; and to improve our financial health. We have already started to act on these priorities and are confident in our ability to accomplish specific goals the next few years.

In the midst of a global pandemic and a nationwide outcry for racial justice, survivors of domestic violence and their families need access to crisis safety services more than ever. Although some crime rates have dipped during the pandemic, domestic violence, murder, and aggravated assault rates have been rising. The "Safe at Home" order assumes that home is a safe place. However, for those in abusive relationships, being at home can mean being confined with their abuser partners. They use violence to gain power and control over their partner. When they experience a loss of control in other aspects of their life, through financial insecurity, uncertainty of the future, or interruptions in day-to-day activities, it is common for them to assert their power by controlling their partner through abuse. Consistent with this, House of Ruth hotline call volume rose 80% during the first months of COVID-19, and the need for safe and stable housing continues to increase for persons experiencing domestic violence.

We have all been impacted by the recent racial unrest and protests across the nation in wake of the George Floyd murder, but the impact has been felt particularly strongly by our Black clients, given their own experiences with law enforcement. This impact has heightened our awareness of the disparities and challenges Black survivors and survivors of color often experience in accessing public services as they seek safety, support, and healing. House of Ruth is reflecting on how to best tailor support services to address these experiences of Black clients and clients of color. We are also holding workshops on white supremacy for leadership and staff. We do not have all the answers, but we know it is important to figure them out. Black Lives Matter. If this year has taught us anything, it is that although our community is facing so many hardships right now, clients, our staff, and the broader community are resilient, strong, and up for the challenge. House of Ruth's vision for the 2020-21 fiscal year is to remain a leader in the domestic violence field and to provide safety and advocacy for survivors of domestic violence. We pledge to continue educating people on healthy relationships, and actively addressing social justice issues like systemic racism, prejudice, violence, and oppression of marginalized communities. We have a shared responsibility to lift our voices and demand a just future, one that celebrates our diversity, and that supports safe and healthy relationships for all.

SUCCESS

STORY

The Corona Virus outbreak has changed ordinary life globally. Simple pleasures like going to a movie or dining out with friends have quickly faded and been replaced with Stay-at-home orders, social distancing rules and facemasks. The U.S. currently has over 5 million cases of COVID-19, and the total continues to climb. For individuals experiencing domestic violence, the pandemic has added another risk factor to leaving their home. Not only are survivors in most danger when fleeing their partner; they must now worry about contracting COVID-19 in their new setting.

For agencies that shelter survivors of domestic violence, the pandemic has added further dimensions of safety and care to the services we must provide. "As a domestic violence service provider, we are well trained in dealing with crisis, and the COVID-19 pandemic is presenting such a unique challenge for us, just in flexing our services to be able to respond," said Pat Bell, the Executive Director for House of Ruth, when interviewed by FOX 11 News earlier this year.

Michelle and her 3-year-old daughter came to our shelter in mid-April, fleeing a six-year abusive relationship. Michelle's partner was verbally and emotionally abusive, destroying her self-esteem.

Despite fears of contracting COVID-19, she left to begin a new chapter in her life and her daughter's. As Michelle put it, "My body was beat down and hurting, I knew I needed to get to a better place, even if that meant going into a shelter." In the following excerpt, Michelle describes her shelter experience during the pandemic.

"When I came to shelter, I was quarantined for two weeks. It wasn't so bad because we had access to food, a smart TV, entertainment, sanitizing supplies, face masks, gloves, emotional support and safety, which was more freedom than what my partner allowed me to have. I was at peace and finally able to rest. I felt at home and I haven't felt that feeling in a long time. My Case Manager provided me with encouragement by doing phone check-ins and keeping me motivated and inspired. This time was especially difficult for me, since my mother was in the hospital ill with COVID-19, and her prognosis seemed exceedingly grim. The shelter staff became my support system, and my faith carried me the rest of the way. Thankfully, she recovered, and although she was left with permanent lung damage, she survived COVID-19.

As for me, I continue accessing shelter services and continue taking precautions by wearing my face mask and washing my hands often. I have bonded with the other residents and literally feel like we are all in this together. I'm grateful to House of Ruth for providing the safety and comfort to restore my self-confidence and appease my fears of a shared living space. I now have a full-time job and got accepted into the House of Ruth second phase housing program. I'm paying down my debt and have begun to save money, so I can restart my own business in the entertainment industry, after the pandemic is over. If I can say something to a person experiencing domestic violence during this pandemic, I would tell them, be strong and leave, go to House of Ruth they will help you, don't be afraid of a shared living space, they will help you restore yourself, just like they helped me."



OUR OUTREACH PROGRAM




PROJECT

House of Ruth experienced a series of burglaries at our Pomona Outreach Office in July 2019. Burglars broke into our storage sheds and stole items reserved for House of Ruth families. Heartbroken staff members, board members, Pomona city officials, businesses, donors, service clubs, volunteers, and community members immediately jumped into action. Thanks to our supporters' generosity, we received monetary assistance to purchase and install a new security system, replenish in-kind goods, and replace the old storage unit with a new and improved unit.

A special thanks to the National Community CORE'S Chris Paez and Chris Killian for coordinating the donation delivery and installation of the storage container and for collaborating with Advance Iron Works on the new gate. Finally, a warm thank you to Ray Escoto and Bob Barker for volunteering their time and assisting with multiple projects during this time of need.

Some of the activities the Children's Program utilizes to promote resilience include: emotional check-ins to discuss feelings, counseling, painting, jewelry making, arts and crafts, gardening, board games, virtual tours of museums, aquariums, and botanical gardens, water activities, movie nights, and tutoring. These activities promote creativity, empathy, mindfulness, patience, joyfulness, learning, and a sense of community.

Although most of our outreach services are hybrid, our shelter staff has continued to provide in-person supportive services to families fleeing domestic violence.






DISTANCE LEARNING CENTER

Our multipurpose conference room received an unexpected renovation this past year when Cal OES released funding to nonprofits to address COVID-19- related challenges. With an award of \$18,750, House of Ruth has now completed renovations to create a socially distant learning space for clients, volunteers, and staff. This new space will enable staff to deliver high quality services including educational classes, training programs, and meetings conducted on an online platform, while ensuring our families' health and safety during the pandemic.

Our new Distance Learning Center is equipped with a state-of-the-art smart board, and rolling tables and chairs that comply with social distancing guidelines. Facilitators have the ability to host and record in-person training sessions and simultaneously stream them online, enabling participants to follow in real time or to watch pre-recorded content. Participants will need to have access to a smart phone to view the content. If online access is unavailable to them, they may participate in person, adhering to social distancing rules and wearing face masks to reduce COVID-19 transmission. House of Ruth is proud of this major accomplishment and is thankful to Cal OES for funding the project, to David Spencer Painting for donating paint, and to all our vendors who assisted with the project. Special thanks to Ray Escoto and Bob Barker for volunteering their time and talent.

Faced with school closures during the pandemic, the Prevention Education program turned to Instagram Television, where it launched a new video series called Wellness Wednesdays, filmed live on social media every Wednesday. This space enables teens to continue to increase their knowledge of healthy relationships, boundaries, consent, mental health awareness, and self care. Wellness Wednesday videos have already reached over 1,600 views.



With our Wellness Wednesdays video series, House of Ruth has harnessed the power of social media to provide an integral part of our programming. The Prevention Education Team plans to continue to produce these videos even after they are able to resume in-person programs. The Prevention Education program remains committed to expanding our Youth Advisory Committee and to developing creative ways for you to engage with the agency and with communities. In addition, webinar training sessions for educators will be incorporated into their distant learning curricula.

COVID-19 NON-PROFIT FUNDRAISING STRATEGIES

In this environment, House of Ruth held its first Virtual Moveable Feast event in June 2020. This beloved event has been a House of Ruth tradition for decades. 
